Difference Makers

A recent study reveals that 38.7% of United Methodists read scripture outside of religious services at least once a week, 37.1% look most to "religious teachings and beliefs" when it comes to questions of right and wrong, while 25% participate in prayer groups, scripture study groups or religious education programs at least once a week.1

One of my spiritual practices over the past several years has been a daily devotional aptly named *Pray* As You Go. It is a daily prayer session designed to go with you wherever you go. Just pop in your ear buds or put on your headphones, and you are good to go. Most days, though, it is the first thing that I listen to in the morning, even before my feet hit the floor.

In a recent episode, the scripture reading was from Jesus' sermon on the mount (Matthew 5-7). Not the beautiful passage that we have come to know as the Beatitudes, instead they were words that challenge me in my walk as a Christian.

Jesus said: "You have heard that it was said, 'An eye for an eye and a tooth for a tooth.' But I say to you, do not resist an evildoer. But if anyone strikes you on the right cheek, turn the other also; and if anyone wants to sue you and take your coat, give your cloak as well; and if anyone forces you to go one mile, go also the second mile" (Matthew 5:38-41).

The voice asked, "How do you react to this idea?" I began to ponder that question when moments later she asked, "Does the fact that it comes from Jesus make any difference?"

The latter question I found more jarring than the former. Is the way that I choose to live my life based on Jesus' teaching, even his hard teaching? Or do I compartmentalize the more challenging aspects of what it means to be a Christian while holding on fiercely to the comfy, cushy parts of our faith?



The very first words of these verses, "You have heard that it was said, but I say to you," tell us that Jesus' teaching is different from what they have known. His teaching moves beyond the familiar and beckons to a new way of living in this world, and indeed points to a new world. Those who follow Jesus are called to a new way of life that is centered in his challenging life transforming and teaching, and his revelation of God's love for the world. Yet, I have learned that I can only begin to follow him and wrestle with his teaching through his life-transforming presence, through the leading and guiding of the Holy Spirit. "Not by might nor by power, but by my Spirit" (Zechariah 4:6).

Upon closer look at this passage seen in its cultural context, Jesus was teaching to an oppressed people with little power in occupied first century Palestine. He provided a way of reclaiming one's power through actions that revealed the unjust brutality of the powerful over those with little power. He sought to bring justice and an end to retaliation. An "eye for an eye leaves everyone blind." In the verses that follow, Jesus calls for love not only of one's neighbor but one's enemies. Jesus knew the transformative power of mature love. Love, Jesus' way, means a radical commitment to justice.



The hard and challenging teachings of Jesus are exactly what we need to consider most when we are faced with challenges, when people and institutions seek to divide rather than unite, when our impulse is more given to revenge and retaliation than reconciliation and transformation of relationships. It does make a difference that it is different because Jesus' life, death, rising and presence make a difference. Those who work to follow his teaching are difference makers.

However, a recent study reveals that 38.7% of United Methodists read scripture outside of religious services at least once a week, 37.1% look most to "religious teachings and beliefs" when it comes to questions of right and wrong, while 25% participate in prayer groups, scripture study groups or religious education programs at least once a week.¹

My devotion that morning was a reminder that "Jesus is encouraging people somehow to do more and do better." Yet, we can only do more and do better through God's Spirit and our own commitment to seek to do better, and by wrestling with Jesus' challenging words. When we do, we will see our lives and our relationships transformed.

I invite you to engage in many of the individual or group offerings provided through Gary Church. Subscribe to our weekly Gary Church podcast and/or the Pastor Brian podcast (which resumes mid-July). 

Please welcome Carson Rewiski to the Gary Kids team as this summer's Sunday Morning Assistant. Carson has been attending Gary UMC for



ou might be able to spot a Gary knitter because they often have their latest project on their lap. Needles clicking, prayers weaving into the yarn, hearts pouring into each stitch. They knit prayer shawls for people having a rough time, they knit afghans for high school graduates, they knit baby afghans for brand-new members of the Gary Church family. Really, many of them have knit just about anything, from sweaters to bears and beyond. You can be sure that whatever they knit, if you wrap up in it, you'll be wrapped with love.

For **Julie Raab**, knitting prayer shawls is very calming and allows her to center in a prayerful manner, while creating something that will bring someone peace and joy. She says, "Although I may not know to whom my shawls are given, I always hope that when they wrap themselves with their shawl that they feel comforted and are reminded that they are loved, and that God is always present in our lives."

Nancy Brunner says she especially likes to create high school graduate afghans. She says, "I love the thought of sending our church kids out into the world with a blanket from their church, that they can wrap up in when they're homesick, sad, happy or feel like they need a hug. I like to think of my prayers for them being knit into the stitches, so a little part of Gary Church will be with them in their next chapter of life."

Bobbi Wheatley says, "We sometimes incorporate the multiples of three with the stitches to imbed the Trinity into the design of prayer shawls and afghans, and we pray for the recipient while knitting as a blessing to a person we may know or not."

Red Bird Mission

Red Bird is our August Mission focus. The mission, clinic and school have been serving the isolated and desperately poor of Central Appalachia since 1921 and have a long-standing relationship with the United Methodist Church. Gary has been supporting their work for over 20 years.

The mission supplies a large array of support services to the population of the mountainous area. Red Bird Mission School is a Pre-K through 12 school that provides quality education in a loving Christian environment. They provide youngsters with the education they need to escape poverty and become successful community leaders for their people. The school can also provide live-in opportunities for students who live too far away to commute.



Red Bird offers their community a full-service dental clinic and a community health nurse, blood mobile services, health fairs, patient education, hearing aid assistance and over 300 home health visits annually. They

offer a craft marketing program and off-site craft fairs to help increase economic opportunity to their area. Their community store offers free or low-cost clothing and furniture, a food pantry and supplies of clean drinking water. They also provide low cost or free groceries to support their clients.

Red Bird works tirelessly through community outreach to care for the needs of the elderly, low income and children of Central Appalachia. Their need for support has increased dramatically through the year of COVID as they try to support the needs of their communities. In addition, the area has been especially hard-hit by the series of severe storms that have ravaged the South this year. So, we would ask that you consider being as generous as possible in your support for them. You can give through our regular Gary Giving channels during the month of August and beyond. You can also help by using Amazon-Smile, which has a giving list supplied by Red Bird. It can be found under Human Services in the AmazonSmile Lists. If you desire to create an AmazonSmile account, 0.5% of all your purchases will be donated to Red Bird.

Prison ministries update

There are 28 prisons in Illinois, and at the height of the pandemic, every single prison had COVID-19 cases among the inmates and staff. Things are much better now. I attended a recent RTO (Radical Time Out) meeting, and it was announced that only two prisons (Stateville and Sheridan) still have COVID cases – but only a few. This good news means that visitation has opened up. There is no use of the vending machines for snacks, and visits are for shorter time frames, but still. folks are so happy that they can visit their imprisoned loved one. Denise went to visit her husband. She was disappointed that there was a plastic barrier between them, and it was very difficult for them to hear each other speak. The second time she visited him, the barriers were still in place, but the sound system had been improved. It had been 14 months since she had seen him. It has been 15 months since a mother, Janice, has seen her son. She told me she hoped there are no barriers in the visitation room at his facility. "Judy," she said. "I just want to touch my son." We also extend our gratitude to **Pastor Chris Pierson** for his service to JUST of DuPage, a social service agency and ministry within the DuPage County Jail. JUST stands for Justice, Understanding, Serving and Teaching. Pastor Chris has recently stepped down from the

How can I keep from singing? by Jennifer Whiting

We Christians share an irrepressible need to sing. The hymn "How can I keep from singing" became a touchstone for us during the pandemic. Kevin Lange often closed "Hymns at Twilight" with it.

"Pauline T." is all we know of the author of this devotional poem, published by The New York Observer on August 27, 1868. The Faith We Sing (#2212) misattributes the lyrics to Robert Lowry. Pete Seeger stripped her poem of its distinctly Christian message and made the song popular in the folk revival of the 1960s.

Yet, one and a half centuries after Pauline's composition, her words are the best explanation of our keen desire to return to singing. It is the primary language of Christian worship.

Pauline T.'s poem is now in the public domain. We sing it through tears of joy!

My life flows on in endless song;
Above earth's lamentation,
I hear the sweet, tho' far-off hymn
That hails a new creation;
Thro' all the tumult and the strife
I hear the music ringing;
It finds an echo in my soul—
How can I keep from singing?

What tho' my joys and comforts die? The Lord my Saviour liveth; What tho' the darkness gather round? Songs in the night he giveth. No storm can shake my inmost calm While to that refuge clinging; Since Christ is Lord of heaven and earth, How can I keep from singing?

I lift my eyes; the cloud grows thin; I see the blue above it; And day by day this pathway smooths, Since first I learned to love it, The peace of Christ makes fresh my heart, A fountain ever springing; All things are mine since I am his—How can I keep from singing?






Jesus and John Wayne: How White Evangelicals Corrupted a Faith and Fractured a Nation


