## Teach Us to Number Our Days

Teach us to number our days, that we may gain a heart of wisdom. Psalm 90:12

The music app that I listen to, Spotify, invited me to see how I listened through the year 2020. Apparently, my favorite music is Christian music, my favorite artist is Gregory Porter (top 1%), my most binged podcast was Pastor Brian's (sorry, but I got behind schedule).

Spotify then thanked me for listening "all 670 months during 2020." Spotify was spot on with my music and podcasts, but they could use some help learning to number their days. But they are right; due to COVID-19, it really did feel like 2020 would never end. But how do we, as Christians, "number our days"?

In many African American churches, like the African Methodist Episcopal Church I attended growing up, there is a tradition to mark the passing of one year to the next by attending "Watchnight Service." One could always be assured that, if not at your own congregation, there would always be one at a nearby church. In more recent years, they have become an alternative to the more raucous secular celebrations that have grown in popularity, or to watching the ball drop in Times Square.

Watchnight Services likely began with the Moravians nearly two centuries ago and were appropriated by John Wesley, though held more frequently and not relegated to New Year's Day. These developed and grew into Covenant Renewal Services and by 1775 Wesley was writing of large services and the great blessing they were to many. Five years on, Wesley wrote that they had the largest congregation at the renewal of their covenant with God which ever met upon the occasion, and they were thoroughly convinced that God had not departed from them, and never will, unless we first depart from God.

In 1785 Wesley wrote, "Whether this be the last or no, may it be the best year of my life!" The service once again was a large one and Wesley lived on for several more years. Our Wesleyan roots run deep. Whether it is harvests, the lengthening of days, or the start of a new year, religious life has always looked for ways to connect with the rhythms and seasons of life to make them more meaningful, to infuse them with spiritual depth and breadth. We can look back with joy or sadness for what has been and look forward with anticipation for what shall come-the new. It can be an opportunity to renew our faith commitments to God and to decide again to make the most of time.



Henri Nouwen wrote, "We must learn to live each day, each hour, yes, each minute as a new beginning, as a unique opportunity to make everything new." He invited his readers to imagine each moment filled with new possibilities, each day filled with new promises. That is what we often hope for when we anticipate the passing of a year and the dawn of the new.

Psalm 90, arguably one of the most depressing of the Psalms upon first reading, proclaims that our days are "toil and trouble, soon gone and we fly away." Yet, it contains a much deeper message. It encourages us to take the long view of life and to live each moment making the most of our days and learning through our struggles. In the end, the psalmist speaks of rejoicing and of gladness, and of God's glorious power and favor.

As we begin the New Year, may we number our days that we might gain a heart of wisdom. May we be assured that come what may, "God has not departed from us and God never will!" And may this year (2021) be the best of your life!

## Learn How to Join a Zoom Meeting by Phone!

Even without a smartphone, tablet, or laptop, you can start connecting with Gary groups in the New Year using a traditional phone! Check out these instructions and learn how!

### Joining a Zoom meeting using a traditional phone is useful when:

- you do not have a microphone or speaker on your computer
- you do not have a smartphone (iOS or Android)
- you cannot connect to a network for video and computer audio

#### Here's how to join a meeting with a traditional phone:

- 1. Dial in by location. In the Chicago area, that number is 312-626-6799. In the US you can dial 646-558-8656 or 877-369-0926 US toll-free.
- 2. You will be prompted to enter the meeting ID—the nine (9), ten (10), or eleven (11) digit ID provided to you by the host, followed by #. For example, the meeting ID for Worship Talk is 878 0812 5188, so you would dial that number followed by #.
- 3. You may be prompted to enter your unique participant ID. If you don't have a participant ID, just press #.
- 4. You will be prompted to enter a passcode provided to you by the host, followed by #. For example, the passcode for Worship Talk is 5084125, so you would dial that number followed by #.
- 5. If the meeting has not already started and "join before host" is not enabled, you will be prompted to press # to wait for the meeting to start.

Once you are in the meeting, make sure to let the host know who you are and that you've joined by traditional phone. We look forward to your participation in our Zoom classes!

## Gary Makes a Difference by Educating Girls

The three-week adult education class, "The Power and Challenge of Educating Girls," was well received by its participants. Tens of millions of

girls globally cannot attend school and less than half of those that start primary do not enter secondary school. Yet, there is strong evidence that educated girls and women lift up whole communities, positively impact economies, and lead more fulfilling lives.

Reflecting on the incredible impact of a girl's education, the adult education class decided to find ways to support girls'

education in third-world countries during 2021. We are exploring options to support girls of all ages—either by sponsoring education costs or helping to mitigate obstacles to their education.

## Why did Jesus go to hell?

One of the questions Gary Youth asked was, "Why did Jesus go to hell?" Have you ever wondered about that line in the Apostle's Creed, "He descended into hell"? Some churches have changed it to "He descended to the dead," and others have taken the line out altogether. What was Jesus doing there? Why did Jesus have to go to hell of all places?

Did you know that the Hebrew Scriptures do not have a developed doctrine of the afterlife, much less one for heaven and hell? Instead, it was believed that all persons go to Sheol (Hades in Greek), which is the place of the dead. This particular line in the Creed is based on a passage from 1 Peter, in which it is written that Jesus descended to the place of the dead and preached the good news to the people gathered there. Yes, Jesus went to hell to preach the good news. Sounds like something Jesus would do, doesn't it?

Theologically, the importance is twofold. The first is that God in Jesus really experienced the totality of human death-not just the crucifixion, but also the descent to Sheol. Second, even a place that seems most removed from God is, in fact, not beyond the good news of Jesus Christ.

Sometimes, hell is experienced on earth, and Jesus shows up there too. Romans 8:38–39 says, "I'm convinced that nothing can separate us from God's love in Christ Jesus our Lord: not death or life, not angels or rulers, not present things or future things, not powers or height or depth, or any other thing that is created." When we experience hell on earth, the good news is that Jesus is there. The added good news is that when others experience hell on earth, God has empowered us to go there and declare God's presence. Who knew that Jesus going to hell is such good news?

Methodists have always been a singing people. Charles Wesley himself was one of the most prolific hymn writers in church history, with 8,989 hymns to his credit!

Singing praise to God through great hymns has always brought unity, strength, and comfort to our church. But for ten months, we have been denied the act of communal singing, and this has hit us hard.

We also draw unity, strength, and comfort from our liturgy and prayers. To me, the most precious moments of our livestreamed worship are when we speak the Lord's Prayer together.

When I close my eyes and repeat the words of Christ, I imagine all the Gary people who are saying these cherished phrases at the same time. I picture you in your living rooms, eyes closed, coffee in hand, talking to God with me.

Somehow, this makes me feel closer to our church family. Samuel Stone's hymn calls it "mystic sweet communion." I get the same sense of communion during Kevin Lange's Hymns at Twilight. During that hour, I feel close to everyone who is watching and humming along. Though we are not sitting side by side, we are connected across the fiberoptic miles by hymns that declare our faith and strengthen our hearts.

## The Sounds of the Carillon

A few weeks ago, I found myself alone in the office, working on a tight deadline. I was feeling panicky. The board retreat packet still needed a lot of work. My shoulders hurt from hunching over my computer and I began to second-guess myself. Maybe I bit off more than I could chew, changing careers in a pandemic.

In September I took on a new full-time job as president of the Wheaton Chamber of Commerce. Due to the pandemic, our office is closed. From time to time, though, I work in the chamber office on Wesley Street, just east of the DuPage Historical Museum. The building has large windows that overlook Adams Park.

The door was propped open that night to let in the fresh air. As I looked at the clock, anxious about my looming deadline, I suddenly heard a familiar sound: the carillon from Gary Church



began to play, just across the park. Slowly I got up from my computer and walked over to the door.

The hymns of the carillon washed over me. I felt as if the church came to me that night. I was wrapped in the love of our congregation, conjured out of the notes and the air. The music brought visions of being inside the sanctuary-I was transported. I envisioned the heads in each pew, nodding along with the sermon, heard an "Amen" from Pastor Brian and the cries of a baby, felt the warmth of light coming through stained glass. I experienced both shock-our carillon!—and peace. I finished my work through tears and went home.

As we gathered outside together on

Christmas Eve, we created a new tradition, singing along with the carillon. That's what this pandemic has required of us: new traditions, new ways of being. None of it is easy. But sometimes, when you least expect it, there's a song in the air. Listen. Breathe. And, as I did that night in my office, give thanks. "Since the early 1960s Gary Church and community have enjoyed the daily pleasant sounds of bell tower music from our electronic carillon system. Unfortunately, that beautiful sound went silent in 2018 when the carillon system failed and could not be repaired. Trustees began researching replacement alternatives and in late 2019 approved a project to install a new Schulmerich Electronic Carillon.

"The system included new speakers on the top of the bell tower and a new electronic control system. We also ran a communication cable to the new carillon so that Kevin Lange could make changes to the system over the internet. The new carillon became operational in February of 2020 and we are back to playing beautiful music at 9 a.m., 12 noon, and 6 p.m. each day."

~ Gerry Schmidt, Trustees Summary Report for 2020 Church Conference:

"Gary Church's original carillon, a Schulmerich Magnebell II, was installed in 1963. The system ran on eight-track tapes and the speakers were in poor condition. In December of 2019, the Trustees voted to purchase a new Schulmerich Series One Carillon. The goal was to get the carillon installed before Easter of 2020.

"Given the sudden and unforeseen consequences of this pandemic, the timing of this project was perfect. In February of 2020, the new carillon was installed, programmed, and began playing music. The system is fully connected to the internet and allows Kevin Lange, our carillon champion, to program the music as he sees fit.

"The play times were expanded to 9 a.m., 12 noon, and 6 p.m., Monday through Saturday. We adjusted the Sunday schedule and made some adjustments for volume and content. Thank you to those who have shared your very positive responses to this outreach ministry of music. We look forward to continuing this well into the future."

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Christmas Sharing served many in our community once again, even with all the adjustments necessary during this unprecedented year. Despite the inclement weather on December 12, Gary's dedicated volunteers came out and worked hard. It was great to be together again! St. John Lutheran Church was a wonderful host. Their extensive parking lots allowed for no backup of traffic onto the streets. Tents, particularly those over the food distribution area, made a huge difference on a wet, cold day.

Our Gary congregation has a long tradition of supporting *Christmas Sharing*, but your help this year was simply amazing! The total raised by all eight churches and the Facebook site was over \$65,000! Guests received \$100 gift cards, with families of six or more receiving \$150 gift cards. The Northern Illinois Food Bank was very cooperative and helpful in educating us to the process of distribution in this new format. They had great personnel on site to assist. Our guests received shelf staples, dairy, produce, and a protein box. We want to thank Northern Illinois Food Bank's Director of Corporate and Foundation Giving, Jeannine Kannegiesser, who helped facilitate our partnership this year with NIFB.

In this, the 51st year of Christmas Sharing, we are grateful for Gary Church's continued support for our neighbors in need. Thank you for demonstrating such love and care for God's people during an immensely challenging time.

## 2021 Lenten E-Devotional

**Prayer:** a prayer focus for the day

Action: an action step based on the message

Contributor: your name
