The Season after Pentecost: We All Have Gifts

The Apostle Paul, in the twelfth chapter of his letter to the church at Rome, instructs the believers on their new life in Christ. He insists that this new life is to be lived in community with others who believe in Christ and it is to be a life lived in humility. Paul appeals to individual members not to think too highly of themselves, because the life that Christ intends can only be sustained by living together in humility.

Paul's understanding of this new beloved community, created through the power of the Holy Spirit Christ promised his followers, is

How might you support our common work of using the gifts we have been given in the name of Jesus and the power of the Holy Spirit? one of an intimacy so profound that Paul could only describe it by com paring it to the human body. "We are one body in Christ," Paul writes, "individually we are members of one another."

Yet, even as we live in humility and in intimate community with one another, Paul reminds us that we all have gifts that differ but they have been graciously given to us by the

Holy Spirit. These gifts of the Spirit then, connect us with God and one another. They are given in order to build up the body of Christ that we might grow that we might be built up in love each doing its part (Eph. 4:16).

It is one of the reasons that I so love Pentecost Sunday and the season after Pentecost. We are reminded that God poured out God's Spirit and gave people gifts and abilities they never had. The season after Pentecost begins with Trinity Sunday (this year May 30) and concludes with Reign of Christ Sunday or Christ the King Sunday (this year Nov. 21). It is the longest season

in the Christian year.



"The purpose of this season is to support our common work of using the gifts we have been given in the name of Jesus and the power of the Holy Spirit." In Romans, Paul lists the different gifts we have been given to be shared in the body of Christ: "If your gift is prophesying, then prophesy in accordance with your faith; if it is serving, then serve; if it is teaching, then teach; if it is to encourage, then give encouragement; if it is giving, then give generously; if it is to lead, do it diligently; if it is to show mercy, do it cheerfully" (Romans 12:6b-8).

This past year has been challenging in so many ways as we've all made adjustments during the coronavirus pandemic. However, I think one of the biggest challenges many have faced is how to live our new life in Christ in community and sharing our gifts so that the reign of Christ is known among us. There are so many ways we can use our gifts throughout the year but in the summer we have additional opportunities; especially for those whose busy schedules do not otherwise allow them as many opportunities to share their gifts.

Vacation Bible School, BLAST Camp, Middle School Stay Camp, Family Camp, Class Meetings, Glow Challenge and Immersion Ministry experiences are just a few of the opportunities to utilize the gifts that God has given us and experience the blessing of new life in Christ in ways above and beyond what we might imagine.

Consider this: "In this season after Pentecost how might you support our common work of using the gifts we have been given in the name of Jesus and the power of the Holy Spirit?"

Adult Christian Education and Discipleship

In the year before "social distancing" was a common term and masks were needed to enter grocery stores, Gary's Adult Christian Education Committee was hard at work drafting a mission statement that would guide the ministry in the years to come. Through



prayer and reflection, the committee determined that the Adult Christian Education ministry aims to provide a variety of Christian Education opportunities that deepen faith, equip disciples and transform the world. The ministry was in full swing when the pandemic struck and everything came to a halt. After a period of adapt-

ing to a new normal, the group met to discern a way forward and achieve its mission for the 2020-2021 ministry year.

The first initiative was Worship Talk, an informal online gathering that invited congregants to discuss the morning's service over a cup of coffee. While the structure was simple, the conversation was robust. **Rev. JoAnne Chase** said, "I truly believe that Worship Talk helped me stay positive this past year, feel connected and not alone, dig into the sermon and find personal meaning, and deepen my relationship with God through scripture and conversation." Worship Talk met folks where they were (often in their living room) and helped deepen faith.

In addition to Worship Talk, the committee developed a Monday night ministry model on Zoom that would run from September to May. Zoom classes focused on different topics from exploring scripture to engaging in spiritual practices, learning about and participating in works of social justice, supporting Christian disciplines and experiencing fellowship. Carey Williams Bebar said, "I loved the Advent Study, Christmas in the Four Gospel Homes. Cynthia M. Campbell's work helped me experience the incarnation from the perspective of each gospel author and truly prepared my heart for the coming Christ child." The Monday night offerings were designed for church and community members at various stages of their faith journey.

Whether participants were starting their search or maturing in faith, they were able to find their place and grow as disciples.

The Monday night series also bore fruit. In March, Judy Selby and Cathy Mousseau took their Power and Challenge of Girls' Education class to the next level and led the Educate a Girl/Change the World Campaign. For three weeks the congregation read extensively, listened to stories, and raised funds to support girls' education around the globe. Cathy noted that "together, the entire church helped God to transform the world by funding scholarships for nine girls in Africa and Asia. At the same time, the hearts and minds of our Gary members were transformed, as they learned, planned, and came together to empower our neighbors-in-need." The Anti-Racist Book Club also engaged in world-transforming work by creating a safe place to learn about systemic racism as well as grow as anti-racists. Marion Rybarczyk reflected that "being involved in the Anti-Racist Book Club has been such an inspiration and eye-opening experience." He said, "I have never considered myself a racist, but being part of this book club has shown me so much about what it feels like to be Black in America." Other groups, like the Men and Women's Bible Study, Faith Club, and MOPS continued as integral parts of Gary's Christian Education ministry.

Despite a difficult year, the Adult Christian Education Committee found ways to deepen faith, equip disciples and transform the world. For that, we would like to say "thank you" to each committee member: **Betsy Boyd, Rev. JoAnne Chase, Joyce Fahs, Marion Rybarczyk, Michelle Sweeney, Donna Trieschmann, Fred Wayland** and **Dan Wible.** You have blessed our community and enriched our faith.



After enduring a year of hiatus as well as bidding farewell to retiring director **Mike Krueger**, the Men's Chorus is ready for some good news. We are delighted to announce that **Philip Roberts** will assume directorship of this vibrant group in the fall.

Phil's love for singing traces back to high school, performing with the Alabama All State Choir. He went on to study at Elmhurst College where he majored in voice and minored in theology, an ideal combination for one preparing for music ministry.

He says, "Music soothes, heals, inspires, and uplifts. It is a gift from God. We are to share that gift with others adding our own talent and feeling and expression. We minister to each other while we also give back to God."

Phil served in churches for 35 years, directing children's and youth choirs, adult choirs and handbell ensembles. He says, "Music affects everyone differently, yet I feel it has the ability to speak to everyone's souls like nothing else can."

In a 27-year career with GIA Publications, he served as music editor and later as editorial production manager, publishing hymns, music resource material, and editions for choirs, handbells and instruments. He also led choral reading sessions and clinics for GIA nationwide. A prolific composer himself, Phil has over 80 published handbell titles to his credit.

A few years ago, he retired from GIA and from his position as Director of Choirs at Community Presbyterian Church in Lombard. He and his wife **Terri Johnson** moved to Warrenville, and they began attending Gary Church. Terri joined the choir, and Phil was "impressed with Gary's dynamic music ministry." He decided to sing with the Festival Choir in 2019. (Phil and Mike were a powerhouse in the tenor section!)

Making the most of his retirement, Phil enjoys playing with their grandchildren, building 1/72 scale military models, and writing a historical novel about a young Polish man's brave journey through WWII and into manhood. Phil's love of history extends to his job at Cantigny where he guides visitors through the First Division Museum.

Phil anticipates good music and fellowship with his singers. He says, "Gary Church is blessed with many excellent musicians and an array of talented ensembles. It's an honor and a privilege to follow the splendid leadership of Mike Krueger. I eagerly look forward to working with the Men's Chorus and joining the fine music staff at Gary Church."

June Missions Focus



It seems like only yesterday that we blessed the Hays family as they set off to their mission in Columbia, but it has been seven eventful and successful years for Chris and Michelle, as well as their children Judah, Asher and Zoe.

Chris is held in high esteem by members of his organization (United World Mission and the Theological Education Initiative). His immediate colleagues describe him as "disciplined, productive, energetic, reliable, provocative, loyal, steadfast, brilliant and life-giving." In addition to his teaching duties of seven years, including the difficulties of teaching during Columbia's continuing pandemic, he has been important in curricular development. He worked on securing the continued academic accreditation of the undergraduate seminary program and accreditation of a developing master's degree in biblical interpretation. Further, he has joined in the thesis supervision of doctoral students. He is also integral in advancing a Faith and Displacement program to foster the mission within the Columbian Church for victims of violent conflict in northeastern South America.

As if Chris has not been busy enough, he continues with academic research, publishing numerous articles and book chapters in biblical interpretation, theology and church and society. His writing and appearances at conferences have helped create international recognition for his work. He has also built valuable relationships with Islamic theologians.

All in all, we should be proud and happy to have been offering continued support to the Hays family work in a difficult part of the world. - One college student at Africa University (one full-year scholarship plus part of the next year)
- The remaining \$1,469 of campaign funds will be held in reserve for future scholarship opportunities for girls.

Meet Angel & Gloria

Educate a Girl/Change the World

Angel and Gloria are primary school students at the Kinyago-Dandora School (KDS), located in the slums of Nairobi, Kenya. The school is supported by the Kenya Children's Fund, based in



Minnesota. Gary Church is sponsoring full-year scholarships for the two girls covering the 2021–2022 academic year.

Gloria turns 6 years old on June 26 and will begin kindergarten at KDS beginning in late July. She is an only child who lives with her grandmother, in a three-room concrete house. Gloria's grandmother sells vegetables for a living.

Angel will begin third grade this summer and will turn 9 years old on Sept. 3. She lives with her parents and three siblings in a two-room, rented home. Her mother and father are casual laborers.

Angel and Gloria are just two of the 592 students enrolled in primary classes (pre-school through grade 8) at KDS. Academically, KDS is one of the top schools in the district with a pass rate of 85% and students who often win local music and sports competitions. Angel, Gloria and their classmates have the opportunity to matriculate to the Kinyago-Dandora Secondary School. A scholarship fund

supports the many Kingayo-Dandora graduates who continue their studies at universities across Kenya.

During the school year, Kenya Children's Fund will share news about our students' academic progress, and the children will also send us letters. We look forward to updating you on Gloria and Angel's progress through the *Chimes*. Gary Church members also have a wonderful opportunity to correspond personally with the two girls. Ginger Palm, the President and CEO of Kenya Children's Fund, shares this: "As you begin to learn more about your sponsored children, you will be blessed by this new friendship. What may seem like a simple relationship with a child is really the beginning of something much bigger. Sponsorship is more than sharing resources. It is about bringing hope to a child of God (and) her family, as well as their community."

If you—or perhaps a Sunday School class or youth group-would like to send Angel or Gloria an email, birthday card, letter, or holiday card with encouraging words, please contact me. Kenya Children's Fund asks that we only send items that fit into a flat, standard-sized envelope or card. Some ideas include stickers, bookmarks and photos-the children love to "see" their scholarship sponsors. Please note that it typically takes several weeks for the girls to receive our cards and letters. I can help direct you on how to send your correspondence.

We have directed a small amount of funds from our "Educate a Girl" campaign to provide birthday gifts (food, clothes and toys) and holiday gift and food baskets to the girls and their families. The food helps to meet the family's nutritional needs and can elevate their status in the community, as it allows them to share food with their neighbors.

Gary friends, let us pray for Angel, Gloria and their families. Please ask that they stay healthy and safe from violence, which occasionally erupts in their community. We can ask God to help the girls to grow up to become strong, self-sufficient and community-minded young women.

Stay tuned for our next "Educate a Girl" article in the *Chimes*, where **Judy Selby** will share about the UMCOR scholarships that the Gary congregation is also supporting in Cambodia and at Africa University.



Lights, Cameras, Action!

unday mornings during COVID-19 have found many of us sitting on our couches, comfy in our pjs, coffee in hand while attending church online. Have you ever wondered what it takes to stream Gary's Sunday church services to your home? I'm sure you won't be surprised to hear that it takes a lot of people, each doing their specific part, to make it happen. Here's a summary of what is involved each week.

AV Team volunteers wanted If you would be interested in joining the AV team, please contact the Church Office.



An **Order of Service** document is created each week by **Deb Hafner** that somewhat resembles the Sunday bulletin we each received when attending church in-person. Each part of the service is listed along with who is the participant; where in the Chancel they will be located or if it is a video; and if it is a musical performance, the name of the piece and author, along with the length of the song, and if any special equipment might be needed like extra microphones. This document is reviewed by **Jennifer Whiting** and **Janet Mathis**, and when everything is verified and correct, it is published on Box, our online document storage site.

Next comes **Type Setting** by **Tony Venezia** using Adobe software. Every week Tony creates a PowerPoint file that includes all the slides and videos displayed in between sections of the service. He collates information from the Order of Service; art work from **Becky Lemna** (seasonal slide backgrounds) and **Pam Keller** (announcements); and videos of Scripture Reading or Children's Time. When a new liturgical season begins, Tony animates Becky's artwork, and that is used at the beginning and ending of each service. Any of the wonderful photo montages you've seen is also Tony's handiwork. The PowerPoint file is also reviewed by Jennifer and Janet, and when correct, it is placed on Box.

A **Production Rundown** is the next document created, and this is my part in the process. Using the Order of Service and the PowerPoint file, I list what microphones, camera and camera shot, and what slides are used for each part of the service. Then instructions are provided for the AV team as to when microphones are turned on and off, when camera shots and slides are changed, and when to show a camera shot or PowerPoint slide/video to you on the video stream. I also modify the PowerPoint file to add automatic advances of slides to make it easier for the AV Team. For example, all the opening announcements, opening animation and prelude slides advance by themselves after being viewed on the stream for 15 seconds. The Production Rundown and revised PowerPoint file are loaded to Box, and the process continues.

AV Teams, made up of two members of a family so they can safely work less than six feet apart, can begin their work now. They will print and review the Production Rundown, making any creative changes they'd like as far as camera shots go. The PowerPoint file is downloaded from Box to a thumb drive and then loaded to the laptop on the AV desk located in the balcony of the Sanctuary. Most teams do this on Saturday so they can run through the service and practice on the equipment, which provides a good understanding of the flow of the service. One team member runs the sound board, turning on and off microphones and adjusting volume levels; and the camera controller, changing what shot the cameras show. The other team member runs the video switcher which directs camera one, camera two or the laptop to the stream, and advances the PowerPoint slides/videos on the laptop.

Finally, it's Sunday morning and at 8 a.m., all church service participants meet in the Sanctuary for a final run-through of the service. Transitions from one part of the service to the next and final camera shots are refined. At 8:50, the live stream begins and the service commences. The AV team also records the service using two different devices onto a thumb drive and a SD card, which Tony comes to collect after the service. At home he does his editing magic by reducing pauses, zooming in on shots, fixing any AV mistakes and prettying up the service in general. When he's done, the service is loaded to Vimeo and accessible to the congregation. In order for the service to stream live, Mark **Binkerd** schedules the broadcast and sends a code to Becky Lemna who posts it on the church website, so you can view it. On Monday, the whole process will begin again!

We are so blessed to have three technical professionals in our congregation that have made this whole process possible. Mark Binkerd and Dave Mann have spent untold hours helping to set up and test all the electronics necessary for this streaming process. Dave designed the production rundown spreadsheet, set up the standards for the camera shots and held many training sessions to get the novice AV Teams comfortable with running all the equipment. And Tony Venezia created the whole service himself when COVID originally shut down all church functions and participants sent him videos of their portion, and later he produced amazing Christmas Eve and Holy Week services. Anytime there is a problem, these guys drop everything and run to the church to assist.

So, you see, it takes a dedicated team of AV volunteers, church staff and participating congregants to bring a church service to you on your couch every Sunday morning. I'm thankful to all the amazing folks at Gary Church that make our online worship services possible!



Gary Church follows Safe Sanctuary policies

The congregation of Gary United Methodist Church is committed to providing a safe and secure environment for all who participate in the ministries and activities sponsored by the church. It is part of our baptismal covenant to those who have been commended to our care. The following policy statements reflect our congregation's commitment to preserving Gary Church as a holy place of safety and protection for all who would enter and as a place in which all people can experience the love of God through relationships with others.

- No adult who has been convicted of child neglect or abuse of any kind should volunteer or be hired to work with children or youth in any church-sponsored activity.
- All adult volunteers with children or youth of our church must have been involved in the congregation for at least six months before beginning a volunteer assignment.
- Adult volunteers and ministry staff for children should observe the "Two Adult Rule" at all times so that no adult is left alone with children or youth on a routine basis.
- Adult volunteers for children shall attend regular training and educational events provided by the church to keep volunteers informed of church policies and state laws regarding child abuse.
- Adult volunteers and ministry staff shall immediately report to their supervisor any behavior that seems abusive or inappropriate.

On a regular basis, we ask those within our congregation who interact with our children, youth and vulnerable adults to complete a form agreeing to abide by these statements. Being the intergenerational congregation that Gary Church is, nearly everyone falls into this category. Faith or Fear?

For the Spirit God gave us does not make us timid, but gives us power, love and self-discipline 2 Timothy 1:7, NIV

We are finally starting to come out of a year that has caused much fear and timidity for many reasons. The first, and most obvious, is the COVID-19 pandemic. There was fear of sickness, death, isolation and the unknown, and there was good reason to be fearful with about 580,000 deaths from COVID-19 in the U.S. alone. Then there was the isolation



caused by the pandemic which further increased our fear and frustration due to the number of everyday activities that we were not able to take part in, such as eating out, visiting friends and attending church in person. Then there was the economic fall-out as jobs were lost or

incomes were reduced.

Along with our fear of COVID-19, we also saw an increasing fear of immigrants, the fear of refugees and the fear of people of color; a fear that comes from those we perceive as different because we don't really know them. Let's face it, most of our families came to this country from elsewhere. Only the Native Americans are original to this country. (My family is from Western Europe.) All the people who have come, and are coming, to these shores are looking for the same things my family did-freedom and a better way of life.

Diversity of race, ethnicity and culture strengthens the U.S., not weakens it. We are all the same in God's sight-errant children in need of grace and love. All of us Gentiles (non-Jews) are incorporated into the body of Christ by faith as the culmination of God's covenant with Abraham and his descendants through the Messiah, not by skin color or works. We are all brothers and sisters in Christ who are called to live into the spirit of love, power and self-discipline.

We are all brothers and sisters in Christ who are called to live into the spirit of love, power and self-discipline.

As we are more and more free to resume getting out and about, let us reach out and embrace all of our brothers and sisters in God, and work for the good of all as we seek to return to something like normal. Let us not conform to the fearful spirits of this world but "be transformed by the renewing of our minds, so that we may discern what is the will of God-what is good and acceptable and perfect" (Romans 12:2). Let us live into the possibilities that this reboot of our lives brings to do justice, love mercy and walk humbly as the people of God, while cutting each other some slack as we continue navigating these uncharted waters.
