Kids say the greatest things

When they had gone ashore, they saw a charcoal fire there, with fish on it, and bread. Jesus said to them, "Bring some of the fish that you have just caught." So, Simon Peter went aboard and hauled the net ashore, full of large fish, a hundred fifty-three of them, and though there were so many, the net was not torn. Jesus said to them, "Come and have breakfast."

Many years ago, there was a television show titled "Kids Say the Darndest Things." Apparently, the show still airs but the current version pales in comparison to the show that some of us knew and loved. But kids also say some of the greatest things. On Palm/Passion Sunday during the children's message, Pastor Carey asked the kids about Jesus' triumphal entry to Jerusalem riding

Never on a humble donkey, "Why would underestimate Jesus do something so uncool?" the influence Young Zachary Tobias answered, that you can have on the life of another — roung Zachary Tobias answered, When Jesus does it, that makes it cool." It made my day.

we look to

the example of Jesus and his teaching. His life and teaching, and the transforming work of the Holy Spirit can have a powerful life-changing influence on our lives. When Jesus does something such as riding on a donkey rather than a chariot or war horse, showing us the way of humility, or washing his disciples' feet, showing us the way of service and love, he makes it cool. He sets an example for us.



Recently, I came across an interview with world-renowned chef and humanitarian José Andrés. Beyond his many famous restaurants, his commitment to meet the needs of those who hunger in disaster and war-torn areas around the world through his organization World Central Kitchen is inspiring. Andrés immigrated to the United States in 1990 and honed his culinary skills.

A strong believer in the American Dream, his motivation to serve the world's hungry came from seeing the inaction of institutions during Hurricane Katrina. It has led him to places like Haiti and most recently, the Ukraine.

His passion, however, started with his mother and father who regularly cooked delicious meals and extended their table to others. Never underestimate the influence that you can have on the life of another — especially those closest to you. He was also deeply impacted by his faith. Andrés said in an interview "I was raised in a Catholic family that was always helping and feeding people. ... As a little boy going to religious classes, I thought Jesus was so cool. He could do so much like make breakfast for fishermen. Jesus cooked it himself." Never underestimate the power of witnessing about Jesus and the impact that it can have on others especially our children.

Theologian Frederick Buechner once said, "Vocation is where our greatest passion meets the world's greatest need." Andrés has been able to look back on his life and see a "through-line" of a faith that was shaped by his parents' examples, stoking his passion, and the teaching of the church, through a lay person, or a deacon or a priest that helped his passion become a calling.

We may not all have the kind of global impact that Andrés has with his organization, but we can model for others faith as his parents did. We can teach, lifting up Jesus, in such a way that someone thinks, "Jesus was/is so cool" that they find their vocation — actually, that is our calling.

This year United Methodist Churches in the Northern Illinois Conference are invited to participate in a special offering for Ukraine at the June session of annual conference. I encourage you to prayerfully consider how God may be calling you to give and be a source of hope to people in this war-torn region.

Gary Church supports a variety of local, regional and international organizations, enabling individuals to live their faith through prayer, hands-on work, financial support, donations of needed items, companionship, presence and/or systemic change. We support other causes of the United Methodist Church that allow us to combine our offerings with those of other United Methodists, nationally and globally, to enact change around the world.

Gary Youth Mini-Golf Fundraiser








Book discussion with Gary Youth

At Gary Youth, we want to provide opportunities for our youth to be transformed by the gospel of Jesus Christ. That's why we are going to Floyd County, Kentucky this summer! Trips like these are critical for the faith development of our youth because of their transformational quality. Mission trips allow our youth to meet people that live differently than they do, see needs in the world with their own eyes, and experience the power of the Holy Spirit working through their hands. That's why even though our mission trip is at the end of June, our preparation happens months before.







Last month, we got together to do some team building work. We also learned about sensitivity when we are engaged in missions. Imagine going into a home in need of much repair and we see a brand-new 60-inch flat screen TV. What are our first honest thoughts? How should we seek to understand? What if the home we are assigned to is littered with garbage? What is our first honest reaction? How can we begin to understand? These types of discussions help us understand poverty more deeply and learn how we can begin to walk alongside those who are suffering without taking away their dignity. We want to learn to do all the good we can without doing harm.

It is for freedom that Christ has set us free. Stand firm, then, and do not let yourselves be burdened again by a yoke of slavery. Galatians 5:1

So if the Son sets you free, you will be free indeed. John 8:36

We are heading into summer, the time of the year when the weather is warm, and we are free to go outside and do the things we like to enjoy in the outdoors. Children are "free" from school, and adults are looking forward to vacations somewhere and being away from work for awhile. The Fourth of July is coming up, when we celebrate our country's freedom, and life seems a little freer and easier.

I have been seeing the word freedom bandied Let us freely about quite a bit lately, but it lacks definition or context. It is usually love of God implying that some value freedom more than others and that our freedoms are being threatened. But I still wonder what they mean by

> Freedom taken to the extreme is anarchy, and there are those for whom there is no freedom unless they can do whatever they want to whomever they want. For me this would not be freedom but lawlessness.

"freedom." Freedom from what, or to do what?

There are others who say that we are already free and who are just fine with the way things are. But for others, they live under a system of established racist policies that seek to advantage some while disadvantaging others. This system means freedom for some and oppression for others. That is not true freedom. As Rev. Dr. Martin Luther King Jr. wrote in his letter from the Birmingham jail, "Injustice anywhere is a threat to justice everywhere. We are caught in an inescapable network of mutuality, tied in a single garment of destiny. Whatever affects one directly, affects all indirectly." Truer words were never spoken. We live in a great country with tremendous freedoms, but we still have a way to go until our freedoms can be equally enjoyed by all.

As Paul wrote to the Galatians, Christ has set us free from sin and death, and we must be careful not to fall back into that slavery that is

rampant in our unbridled self-centeredness. While Christ has set us free, there are still boundaries within which we must live to enjoy that freedom. Like Israel, there are expectations put upon our lives in order to live as the people of God in Christ. Some will bristle at any sort of restrictions on their lives, but true freedom in Christ requires it. We are to live our lives out of love for God and neighbor. The law of love requires some restrictions on our actions or it is not love. I will voluntarily not do things to hurt

someone out of love of neighbor. And I will voluntarily spend some time trying to help someone through the hardships of life out of love of neighbor that also reflects the love that God has for us. In Christ, we are set free to be our best selves.

As we go about experiencing the freedoms of summer, let us freely live out our love of God and love of neighbor, and live into Christ's commandment that we love one another as

Christ loves us. In this way, everyone will know that we are Christ's disciples, if we love one another. Let us show we are Christians by our freedom to love.
