# Meals with Meaning

hen you learn about Gary's Meals Ministry, you know there's something special cooking. Each person we spoke with has a story to tell. Sure, there are favorite recipes—a roast, lasagna, chili, salmon, homemade applesauce, fresh-baked cookies. But, when you dig a little deeper, you learn that the meals come from a place of understanding, of empathy. You see, each cook we spoke with had a reason to start making meals for others.

Sometimes the cooks in the Gary Meals
Ministry make meals for people they don't know. Virginia says,
"It's a nice way to meet people." And sometimes they cook for someone nearing the end of their life. No matter who they cook for, Susan says,
"It brings me joy that I can do this for people in need."

For **Susan McGuan**, it all started nearly 30 years ago. She had suffered a miscarriage, and she had informed the church that she and Bernard weren't going to be able to attend the Church Council meeting. That's when **Bob** and **Carol Barnes** brought over a meal. Susan says she was "so touched by their thoughtfulness and generosity." From then on, Susan has been making meals for others. "I think about the struggles people are going through. I think about how Jesus took care of people."

**Fern Evelhoch** was undergoing treatment for breast cancer 10 years ago. She and Bob received meals for months. She thought, "I've got to pay this back. I was so grateful for the help. It was nice to know that so many people cared."

For **Virginia Blackwell**, it was 12 years ago when her husband was dying. She had 8–10 people in her house at any one time, and when Gary Church called to offer meals, her stepdaughter answered the phone and didn't hesitate to say yes. Virginia says, "I was so grateful, I said this is something I can do. It's a way to give back. And I like to cook, so that part's easy."

**Jennifer Ruth** has cooked for the Meals Ministry for many years, and she's also been a recipient after many surgeries. She says receiving a delicious meal means so much. She says when she cooks for people, she "always remembers the gratitude of those who receive them."

Would a meal or more help you? Here's something to think about. Susan says, "I feel awkward asking for help, because I like to help people. But, if you don't give people the opportunity to help you, they miss that experience." Virginia says, "The people who do this, this is not a burden to them. They enjoy it. Take advantage of it."

## Pencil that in

Trust in the promises of Christ's strength, peace and presence.

At our annual Gary Church planning meeting, our meeting where we place items on the calendar for the upcoming year, I lamented to our staff that my notebook was full. It was a wonderful gift, called the Evernote Book, that I received from Dick Wisdom, our former district superintendent. It was amazing! It allowed me to take notes in ink on the special paper, scan the document, and save the information in the cloud and on other digital devices—pretty cool. There was a sense of comfort in the sense of permanency and security that came with using that method.

Over the past year, I have found that at staff meetings we have more frequently said to one another, "Pencil that in." The sense of comfort that we all desire, the deep longing for security, and a sense of permanency are casualties of the coronavirus pandemic.

In a strange twist of fate, when I ordered a new Evernote Smart Notebook, I was surprised when it arrived. Instead of being the size of a journal like the previous version, it was 3.5 x 5.5 the size of an index card. So I am returning it.

In its place, I have ordered a device that will allow me to organize my notes and make my plans for the future much like the previous notebook. However, this comes with a new feature. It still uses ink, and a special kind of pen, but it allows me to wipe the pages and reuse them. I kind of see it as a metaphor for the times that we are living in—a way of saying, "Pencil that in."

Comfort, security and permanency while often experienced as blessings are not biblical themes. Anyone who has experienced tragedy or trauma in life knows how quickly and delicate and ethereal they can be. Our biblical faith calls us not to comfort and security but contentment—not fear but faith.





The apostle Paul wrote to the church at Philippi, "I have learned to be content with whatever I have. I know what it is to have little, and I know what it is to have plenty. In any and all circumstances I have learned the secret of being well-fed and of going hungry, of having plenty and of being in need." He acknowledges the breadth of human experience and proclaims, "I can do all things through Christ who strengthens me." What remains constant is Christ strengthening us in our difficult moments as we journey through what oftentimes feels like wilderness. Likewise, rather than permanency, Christ offers us peace and God's presence—"Peace I leave with you; my peace I give to you. I do not give to you as the world gives. Do not let your hearts be troubled, and do not let them be afraid."

As we approach another ministry season here at Gary Church, we will continue to worship in a variety of ways; we will have many opportunities for fellowship, learning and spiritual formation, small groups, and many opportunities to serve Christ and our neighbors through generous acts of love and giving. The work of God at and through Gary Church continues as we trust in the promises of Christ's strength, peace and presence. Throughout this edition of the Chimes, you will see many opportunities

for people at every stage of life to be strengthened in your life journey. I invite you to look them over, "pencil them in" and commit your way to the way of Christ, our companion and guide.



## tip of the month

It's not always easy to know how to help kids spend time with God on their own, in an age-appropriate way, but here are a few ideas:

- Make sure your child has a Bible they can understand. We use the *Deep Blue Kids* Bible for our third graders but also love Sally Lloyd-Jones' *Storybook Bible* for preschool and kindergartners.
- Teach them a simple way to pray. We like the Five-Finger Prayer which helps children know who to pray for. Thumb: those who are closest to you; Index Finger: those who instruct you; Middle Finger: those who lead; Ring Finger: those who are weak; Pinky: yourself.
- Play kid-friendly worship songs at home. We love our *Treasured VBS* CD, but you can also find Kids Worship Music on Spotify or look for *Listener Kids* videos on YouTube.

On day three, we practiced the Sabbath. Kathrine Inserra, a Deaconess from Kids Above All, started our day off with a meditation using the prayer labyrinth in our church Courtyard. We also had fun bowling at Fox Bowl. On our last day of stay missions, we helped **Pastor Carey** prepare VBS kits, organize Sunday school supply cabinets, and finished off the day by collecting school supplies from our neighbors. They really came through for us!



Each day, we explored what it means to "Arise" together based on Ecclesiastes 3:1 (ESV), "For everything there is a season, and a time for every matter under heaven." This past year, we experienced what it was like to refrain from doing many of the things we love and treasured. It was hard for all of us. Even when things started to lighten up, we found ourselves entering a new "season" each day, week and month. It has been exhausting in

every "season." Nevertheless, God is always working, bringing resurrection in us and in the world around us. Knowing this helps us embrace the value in every part of life, even the hard parts.



















In the month of August, our agenda was to explore a four-year plan for Summer missions for our high school Gary Youth. In order to be of one mind, we discussed the following questions:

- What is the purpose of short-term missions?
- What is poverty?

What is the purpose of short-term missions? When we go on short-term missions, while we do accomplish important work, the real mission field is inside of us. We believe that our goal in going on short-term missions is to help our youth come back and apply what they experienced in their every-day lives. How can they live out justice when they go to school, when they meet new people, when they receive their first paycheck or become a teacher? Making actual change in the world takes more work and engagement than one short-term mission trip, but it can be an important piece of the big picture, a life-long commitment to do no harm, do all the good we can and stay in love with God.

What is poverty? Most times when we think of poverty, we immediately think of a lack of material needs. While this might be true in some cases, the cause of poverty may also be a lack of knowledge, oppression by powerful people and even personal sins. There is more than one type of need out there. This means that what we do while on mission trips can and should vary. We can use our gifts to educate, do social justice work, teach and preach and, of course, provide material resources. As a council, we decided that we want our youth to experience all of these types of missions. And so, while we don't have the exact details yet, we decided:

First year (2022): Construction Second year (2023): International

Third year (2024): Racial Justice/Chicago Fourth year (2025): Environmental Justice

## Health Team updates: check weekly e-news

As of the printing of this edition of the Chimes, Gary's Health Team has updated the following mask policy:

In keeping with recently-updated CDC masking guidance which recommends that everyone, including fully-vaccinated individuals, wear a mask in public indoor settings in areas with substantial and high transmission, we strongly recommend that everyone wear a mask while inside the church—in the Sanctuary and all other parts of the building. #### SUPPORTING STUDENTS IN CAMBODIA

The Gary Church community is supporting the education of two primary school-aged girls and several high school and college-aged women in Cambodia and Africa. You met Glory and Angela, who attend primary school in Nairobi, in the June *Chimes*. In this edition, you will meet the wonderful young women in Cambodia.

### Cambodia

Cambodia, situated between Thailand and Vietnam, is home to the Khmer people. The country, while beautiful and thriving in some areas, is not without its challenges. Cambodia has experienced invasion and oppression throughout its existence; particularly devastating was the late 1970s when 25% of the population, including most of the country's educated population-professors, journalists, doctors, students, lawyers, etc.-died at the hands of a brutal dictator. Consequently, the country's citizens-especially rural femaleshave struggled to rebuild economically, socially and intellectually. The education of young women plays a key role in the lives of these individuals as well as the country.

## **UMCOR Project**

Gary's contribution of \$1000 will support five students. This UMCOR project increases the

chances that these young women will succeed in school by providing uniforms and supplies, extra classes in math and English, books (students must pay for their books if they are to take them home for study) and money for internet (they are currently schooling remote due to COVID-19). These young women are from rural provinces with parents that are farmers, pastors, home makers and, in some cases, single parents struggling to support the family.

While these girls have different circumstances, they are all trying to keep going in the face of a second year of COVID-19 impacted education. All five are dealing with unstable internet and difficult study conditions in small homes among siblings, as well as missing their friends. They know that if they give up now, they will become like their neighbors—most of whom have quit school and work in factories.



In their applications, the students each expressed gratitude for the support from the Gary community and ask that we pray for them in their studies, pray for their wisdom and strength and pray for the end to the COVID-19 situation that keeps them away from friends and teachers.

Please keep Suzan, Sosma, Nisa, Vicheka and Ratha in your prayers, that God's love will give them strength and resolve as they continue the next year of their education. Please also pray for the UMCOR project leaders—Andrew Lee and his team in Cambodia—who are dedicating their lives to furthering the education of women.

## Sing a new song to the Lord

O sing to the Lord a new song; sing to the Lord, all the earth. Sing to the Lord, bless his name; tell of his salvation from day to day. Declare his glory among the nations, his marvelous works among all the peoples. For great is the Lord, and greatly to be praised; he is to be revered above all gods. For all the gods of the peoples are idols, but the Lord made the heavens. Honor and majesty are before him; strength and beauty are in his sanctuary.

Psalm 96:1-6



Singing was central to the worship of Israel, as it is central to our United Methodist worship, which is why 150 psalms have been memorialized in the Bible. King David wrote 73 songs of praise that have come down to us. But he could be considered a slacker next to

the 6,300 hymns credited to Charles Wesley, according to Wikipedia. Singing praise to God was the first thing Moses and the Israelites did after escaping Egypt through the Red Sea. Music has the power to heal and to take us beyond the limits of our physical selves, lifting us a little closer to heavens, whether we are making it or just listening to it. It is one reason that I like to include a psalm in each of our worship services.

Music has the capacity to lift us beyond our individual, ordinary corporal finitude in ways that help us touch the infinite and transcendent. It can lift us out of our ordinary world for a short time to commune our soul with God so that we can understand that no matter the situation of our lives, that we are not alone. We are spiritually connected to the God of the universe across time and space. It is nice to lift our voices to God in song in praise to express our feelings; and something that we can do on our own as well as in community. So, keep a song in your heart and God's praise on your lips even when, if not especially when, life gets hard. It is a great way to lift our soul and our mood beyond ourselves as an offering to God. The hymn sing was so well received that, by popular demand, we will do it again on at least an annual basis.
